

Cape Villano

Camarinas, Spain



This lighthouse is located at the very edge of a very rugged stone ledge, at the very furthest edge of a peninsula over looking the Atlantic Ocean in the town of Camarinas, Spain. It is one of the most dangerous stretches of the "Coast of the Death", but it is also the most beautiful.

This lighthouse is located 410 feet above sea level and is attached to an old building that once was the lighthouse keepers. It has a powerful light that can reach 45 miles out to sea. The reason for this great distance is because of the height of this lighthouse.

First built in 1854, it was rebuilt in 1896. This is one of oldest electric lighthouses in Spain. It was lit with electricity on January 15, 1896.

In 1933 the site was declared a National Interest because of its rocky & steep setting. It is now a National Monument.

In 1890, the English ship <u>HMS Serpent</u>, which sailed the <u>Sierra Leone</u>, sank near the cape because of a storm. It got grounded at the base of the lighthouse. All of the crew went to the upper deck with their lifejackets on. Then they got the lifeboats ready and a big wave came and washed the crew and the lifeboats off the ship crashing them against the cliffs. The next day the bodies were floating with their life jackets on. 173 men perished and were all buried in the English Cemetery (Cemiterio dos Ingleses), a short distance from Cape Villano.

YOUR WEATHER REPORT

Unusual Weather

In the United States we are accustomed to routine weather patterns. We receive cold dry weather from the North and warm wet Weather from the South. This weather usually moves from West to East and is influenced by the Jet Stream. But there are exceptions which are not easily understood and even harder to explain.

For example, in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean there is what we call the Bermuda High. It basically stays in one place although through out the year it will move a little to the East then back to the West, but it always stays in the general vicinity of Bermuda, thus the name.

In the desert regions of the USA, there is a low-pressure system that basically sits over Arizona and Southern Nevada. Low pressure systems are always associated with a warm front and a cold front unless it is a tropical storm. Tropical Storms don't have fronts. But the Southwest low is not a tropical storm.

Although normally weather moves West to East, the Southwestern low and the Bermuda High seem to defy the basic laws of weather movement.

If we look down under, we will see that Australia is having a terrible time with heat and drought. It appears that most of their farmland and cattle grazing land is drying up and burning. Since Australia is surrounded by water it is hard to understand why it is so dry. I was there in 2000 and found the weather to be delightful, so something has changed which I can't explain.

If we look at world weather, we will find this unusual weather all over the world. Some of these weather patterns are natural and we accept it, but how do we explain the unnatural?



Just search for the county, city or beach name where you want to volunteer and you can view the available event dates. You can also send them a donation.

If you don't see the location or date you are looking for, you can host your own Adopt-a-BeachTM event. Your event can be open to the public or private if you already have a group of volunteers. Go to the website and click on "Host your own event".



Skokie Valley will offer America's Boating Course Saturday April 6th at Larsen Marine

Students will learn about channel markers, docking, knot tying, rules of the road, and essential safety procedures. Also radio usage, nomenclature, vessel safety checks, anchoring, and other subjects. The course has a \$50 fee to cover the cost of the book and processing of the final exam. Passing the test provides 12-18 year old students with a certificate to legally operate a wave runner in Illinois. For everyone else, it provides a certificate to lower insurance costs, boat safely, know the rules of the road, dock with confidence, protect their family and maintain their investment.

District 20 Spring Conference



The Palm Beach International Boat Show was in West Palm Beach this year, 29 March through 1 April 2019. Wow!! I thought that I could get to see it while in West Palm.

We were in our very inexpensive Condominium in Boca Raton FL. Actually, we have had it for quite a while. We purchased it when our kids were small, and spent many a happy spring and Christmas break down there. It did not go vacant during "High Season." My wife and I had her parents stay there during winter. I got a three-for out of it. I was a good son-in-law, somebody looked after it, and I got rid of my in-laws for 3 months.

We decided to drive past the site first. The cheapest parking we could find was for \$20. In order to avail ourselves for that, we would also have to take the trolley for 15 minutes to get to the entrance. Then we looked the event up on the internet. The admission was \$28 per person. So, before we could see one boat (or eat one expensive hot dog,) we would be out almost \$80.

By the way, I am not interested in purchasing a new boat – and as I think about it, the cheapest part of boating is actually buying it. That does not include all the stuff you add to the boat, gas, insurance, winter storage, docking costs, etc. In fact, I think that my small 23' Larsen boat costs me about \$250 per hour to brave 4 foot waves in Lake Michigan. But I continued to think about the boat show. My favorite part of a boat show is all the paraphernalia that they sell. I bought my Maui Jim Reader sun glasses one year. I was enticed to purchase new binoculars, PFD's and of course the hooks, line, and sinkers. Each exhibitor must pay to get their product to the exhibition. Then they have to pay the exhibition hall or marina to get a space. The amount of money that they pay and invest in the boat show, is astronomical, or at least the price of purchasing a couple of cruise tickets to Madagascar.

The exhibitor pays the venue. The visitors pay the venue. So, as I think about it, who makes money at a boat show? Clearly the venue owner operator makes money. If the exhibitor makes money, it is by selling his wares. But I thought that the 80 bucks was outrageous. My wife and I passed on it. So who loses? The venue operator and the exhibitors (at least the ones that sell the jewelry cleaners, boat lettering, and boat fenders.)

But I guess that the \$80 is a bar to eliminate the unwashed public from viewing the fine wares that are available. To me, that is wrong. In light of all this, I think that the boat show entry fees should be something small and simple. Like \$5 or \$10 each. Or better yet, free.
