



New Marine VHF radios will change the way they display channel numbers

If you are planning to upgrade your marine radio, there are some changes you probably know about, like Digital Selective Calling. That is the plan from the 1974 SOLAS (Safety of Life at Sea) redo of the VHF radio band to recognize that computers and radios today are merging to be capable of transmitting and receiving data, not just voice. It uses Channel 70 to transmit a data stream so that you can call others without using Channel 16, the standard calling channel and emergency traffic channel. You load your radio with an MMSI (Maritime Mobile Service Identity), a 9-digit number that is assigned to you by the FCC or its agents in the United States Power Squadrons, Coast Guard Auxiliary, or Boat US.



Then you load the MMSI numbers of other boaters you wish to call and bring their name up on your list inside the radio that you loaded prior, press the button, and they get called by the computer chip in your radio. Nice system, but very few recreational boaters bother to use it. If you have an emergency, then it sends your GPS coordinates, MMSI, and nature of emergency that the Coast Guard and nearby boaters can receive and respond with aid.

The latest change by the FCC is an update to those strange channel numbers on your radio that have a suffix letter "A" like 18A through 23A to four-digit numbers that begin with 10 and have the same channel numbers, like 1018 through 1023. The other channels are not affected and will display only two-digit numbers. Most of us use only channels 16 for calling others and monitoring, 9 for marinas, 13 for bridges and locks, 68, 69, 71, 72, and 78A for talking to other boaters, and 21A, 22A, and 23A when directed by the Coast Guard to communicate with them. OK, so why the "A" suffix? Going back to the first use of VHF radios on boats, the FCC set up channels 1 through 28 following International Telecommunications Union (part of the United Nations) meetings, beginning in 1959. Channels 1 through 5, 7, and 18 through 28 were set up in pairs, with one for transmit and one for receive. That way, you could talk on one frequency and listen on the other without having to press the PTT (push to talk, the transmit button on your microphone) to switch between transmit and receive. You could use your radio telephone just like your home telephone and talk and listen at the same time. That mode is called "duplex." Having to use one frequency and use the PTT to talk and use the proword "over" to switch back and forth between talking and listening is called "simplex" mode.

To sum it up, more channels were added over the years, your current radio still works, and the channels you use are simplex channels that require you use your PTT button to transmit while your fellow communicators listen on the channel you are using for transmitting. More digital features are likely to show up down the road. Why did this change happen? To make our VHF radios compatible with those used in other parts of the world. Canada, for example, used to use A suffixes for simplex channels and B suffixes for duplex.

Welcome to the very arcane world of radio and government regulations.



Students Wanted! Piloting: Marine Navigation Course

Marine Navigation is the first course in the sequence of USPS courses on navigation, covering the basics of coastal and inland navigation. It focuses on navigation on recreational

boats and embraces GPS as a primary navigation tool while covering enough of traditional techniques so the student will be able to find his/her way even if their GPS fails. The course includes in-class exercises, developing the student's skills through hands-on practice and learning. Nine classes of two hours each normally are scheduled for presentation of this course. Students have seven days to complete the open book exam.



Course topics include:

- Charts and their interpretation
- Navigation aids pointing to safe water
- Plotting courses and determining direction and distance
- The mariner's compass and converting between True and Magnetic
- Use of GPS typical GPS displays and information they provide, setting up waypoints and routes, staying on a GPS route.
- Pre-planning safe courses and entering them into the GPS
- Monitoring progress and determining position by both GPS and traditional techniques such as bearings and dead reckoning
- The "Seaman's Eye" simple skills for checking that one is on course.
