Marine Weather by SEO Jim Soyka SN-CN

Weather, water conditions, climate data and forecasts are provided by the National Weather Service (NWS) for the protection of life and property. As a boater on Lake Michigan or any other large body of water, current and future weather conditions are very important factors in making informed decisions.



Detailed marine forecasts can easily be obtained from the NWS website as follows:

- ⇒ In the address bar of your computer browser enter: forecast.weather.gov
- ⇒ The NWS map will appear. Click on the lower part of Lake Michigan.
- ⇒ Place the cursor on the area of interest and click. A daily general forecast will appear.
- ⇒ Current conditions collected from buoys can be found under "View Nearby Observations". The data is collected in 10 minute increments and is quite useful in tracking trends.
- ⇒ To get an hourly forecast of weather elements, scroll down to "Additional Forecasts and Information" and click on "Hourly Weather Graph"
 - Check the desired information boxes, such as surface wind, wave height, wave periods, sky cover, rain, fog or freezing spray.
 - Adjust the date and time for the 48-Hour Period you want to view.
 - Click the Submit button for a graphical hourly forecast of each weather element selected.

Weather forecasts are updated several times per day and sometimes have radical changes within a very short time. It is important that the mariner exercise caution when using this information because predictions may not always be accurate for the area of interest. Safe boating for all.


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CAPTAIN AHAB'S QUIZ

America's Boating Club Cruise to Nothern Lake Michigan

The Plan

Friday-Sunday nights in South haven, Plan 1 dinner with all 20 people, 10 boats

Monday-Wednesday nights in Saugatuck at the Ship n Shore, only place in town I could get reservations for 7 boats, 3 were heading south.

Thursday-Saturday nights in Holland for 6 boats, one boat going home after Saugatuck.

Sunday and Monday nights in Grand Haven for 3 boats, 3 heading home Sunday.

Tuesday – Thursday nights in Port Washington.

Friday head back to North Point or stop for a night in Racine.

What Actually Happened

The sail boats wanted to be in port before the power boats just once on the trip, so I changed the reservations for them to leave Thursday morning. Wednesday night the forecast changed and if we did not leave on Thursday we probably could not go until Sunday, so Thursday morning I got reservations changed again and all but 2 boats left Thursday the other 2 could not leave until Sunday due to lake conditions. When we left North Point, I hit GO TO on my GPS and nothing happened, my GPS burned up, glad I had Navionics on my phone.

With almost perfect timing, the sailboats did arrive before the power-boats from North Point by an hour or two. When I pulled into South

Haven Yacht Club to fuel up, the attendant dropped my gas cap in the river, so duct tape to the rescue of course. River dockage has its challenges, with waves and boats rocking all night, this was true for the next 2 ports also.

As for dinner with everyone, no place takes reservations, and no one wants a group that size due to staffing issues. Still, we had many great meals, including Black River Inn, Clementine's, and The Idler. There was lots of shopping, even a farmers' market. Su Casa dinner was not as good as in past years. The marina had a clubhouse at the office that we used one night to play games, have cocktails and order pizza. John walked to Venezia to pick up pizza and it was very good. Four of us had a great lunch at Maria's Italian. We inquired about a reservation and were told if we showed up Sunday at 11:30 am, they would seat us all together on the second floor.



Saturday the forecast changed and if we did not leave Sunday, we may not get out for a few more days, so back to changing reservations. I was able to get Singapore Yacht club to commit to Sunday night for 7 boats, but needed to work on getting us there longer, so we did not have to move. So, the north cruise left before noon on Sunday, while the south cruise had lunch at Maria's and did not get on the water for 3 more days.

When arriving in Saugatuck, Tom, the dock master, was able to pull out a miracle and we were all able to stay in our slips for 4 nights, Sunday – Wednesday. In 14 years, Tom has nev-

er been able to get 7 boats reservations at one time. The only issue to complain about is the showers at Singapore Yacht Club are only 6'1" tall and about 30" square, you need to open the door to wash your feet. Not much of an issue.

We had many great meals here also at Mermaid, Coral Gables and Deb made pork roast one night for all. We used the clubhouse, everyone brought something, and it was a wonderful evening of laughs and good cheer.

While in Saugatuck, it was my birthday, so I wanted to have a birthday dinner with all 14 people. This was more difficult than it sounds. Bob and Kathy found that The Barge would accommodate us, but it is a burger place and mostly outside. There is an upscale restaurant called Bowdey's that I wanted to get, but they needed 48 hours' notice for a group that size. I sent some people for breakfast to Pumpernickel's and Linda spoke to them and they agreed to give us the patio for a birthday dinner. This worked out great with great meals, steaks, fish, and even salads. The crew even surprised me with a Kllwin's chocolate ice cream birthday cake, YUMM.

We got hooked up with a retired boater that works like an Uber to drive you around. The Paisley Pig restaurant is about 1.5 miles. Food was really good so we ate there 2 nights in a row, but we also ordered pizza one night and that was not so good.







We went for a sailboat cruise aboard the At Last; what great views and a handsome captain. Went to town for shopping and ate a wonderful lunch at The Curragh, an Irish restaurant also excellent food, ventured across the street to New Holland Brewing for a couple of beers, nice. We spent an afternoon in the clubhouse at the pool while Sue needed to do some work.

One boat left on Friday to head home and one left Sunday when the last 3 left for Grand Haven. We were really looking forward to Grand Haven as that is where we wanted to go, but were unable to get slips on the weekend, so we went to Holland.

ished changing the hub. I babied it back on plain and was able to successfully return to North Point, I opened it up outside the marina and it worked fine. What great luck.

John and Hilda arrived a couple hours later so all returned safely to home port. Five of the boats have never traveled Lake Michigan ports before but all agree it was a phenomenal trip. Having traveled Lake Michigan quite a bit, I can say I was excited and surprised with the few issues that came up. It rained about 4 times for an hour or less or overnight. Those that travel know that this is not the norm.
